Mexican American Studies in Texas

- Epistemic violence:
 - epistemic side of colonialism is disappearing of knowledge'; a violence that attempts to eliminate knowledge possessed by marginalized groups (Ex: Indigenous codices burned)
 - Others argue it is not necessarily about exclusion, but of representation
- Epistemic Justice
 - Concerned with who is allowed to know what has an impact on social justice
 - Ability to speak and be heard

Mexican American Studies in Texas, Prek-12

- Establishment of prestigious MAS/CHS programs in higher education – UT Austin, UTEP, UTRGV, UTSA
- However, non-existent in prek-12 public schools, even in Texas
- 4.9 million school age children, 51% Hispanic
- To date, Tucson ISD, only one to successfully implement district wide MAS program
- Synthesized Freirian, maya-nahua maiz based epistemologies, critical race theories, decolonial thought
- Reduced pervasive patterns of school dropout, increased school attendance, improved standardized test scores, increased college enrollment
- In 2010, far right dismantled with vicious anti-Mexican campaign through House Bill 2281

Dismantling of Raza Studies program in Arizona spurred nationwide movement to implement Ethnic Studies

In Texas (2014), statewide effort emerged to implement Ethnic Studies in Texas Prek-12 schools

Coalition building between universities and organizations like Librotraficantes

Efforts focused on making MAS a field of study under Special Topics in Social Studies

SBOE didn't crush posssibility, but left it to local districts to implement Special Topics in Social Studies courses: MAS, African American Studies, Native American Studies, Women's Studies

Mexican American Heritage Book

- Summer 2016: First book submitted for approval to SBOE
- Part of larger anti-immigrant, anti-Mexican movement
- Published by former SBOE member, Cynthia Dunbar, and two non-experts, Valerie Angle and Jamie Riddle
- State Board (District 2) member, Ruben Cortez, organized Ad Hoc Committee of scholars to examine and review book
- 141 errors 68 factual errors, 42 interpretive errors, 31 errors by omission
- Perpetuates negative stereotypes of Mexicans
 - Indigenous people of the continent not civilized or intellectually advanced, compared to Europe
 - Chicanos are radicals out to destroy U.S. society
 - Immigrants are criminals and imminent threat to U.S.



Responsible Ethnic Studies for Texas (REST) Coalition

- Meanwhile, MALDEF and Texas Freedom Network organized statewide action to block adoption
- Among other organizations:
 - LULAC
 - SOMOS MAS
 - Librotraficantes
 - GI Forum



Crushing epistemic violence, achieving epistemic justice

- Major victory of REST: SBOE unanimously voted against the adoption of book
